Mr. President, Women's rights are human rights and continuing violence against women constitutes in Commanifestation of this violation.

This is attributable largely to the failure to redress such violations as sexual slavery of the past which is a source of today's and future violations.

In this context, my delegation draws the attention of the Council to sexual slavery imposed by Japanese government and military to women and girls of Korea and the rest of Asia and the world

The United Nations has taken a series of measures to this end including by adopting dozens of resolutions in the Sub-Commission and Commission on Human Rights as well as Vienna Conference In particular special rapporteur on violence against women, Madame Cummaraswami released report including the final one at the 59th Session of the Commission of the Comm

However, this remains so outstanding due to Japanese reluctance. Japan is even denying this as can be seen by the current Japanese Health Minister's description of women as baby producing machines, followed by the current Prime Minister who said "No admission, no apology" for sexual slavery

Consequently, there still remains danger of repetition of such crimes.

In conclusion, Mr. President, my delegation is interested in the view and future plan of the current special rapporteur regarding the settlement of the Japanese military sexual slavery.
